

**SUBSTITUTE FOR
SENATE BILL NO. 878**

A bill to make, supplement, adjust, and consolidate appropriations for various state departments and agencies, the judicial branch, and the legislative branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2027; to provide for certain conditions on appropriations; and to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

GENERAL SECTIONS

Sec. 201. In accordance with section 30 of article IX of the state constitution of 1963, for fiscal year ending September 30, 2027, total state spending under part 1 from state sources is \$844,686,200.00 and total state spending under part 1 from state sources to be paid to local units of government is \$40,441,500.00. The following itemized statement identifies appropriations from which spending to local units of government will occur:

Sec. 202. The appropriations under this part and part 1 are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

Sec. 203. As used in this part and part 1:

(a) "AFIS" means the automated fingerprint identification system.

(b) "CJIS" means Criminal Justice Information Systems.

(c) "Department" means the department of state police.

(d) "DHS" means the United States Department of Homeland Security.

(e) "Director" means the director of the department.

(f) "DNA" means deoxyribonucleic acid.

(g) "DOJ" means the United States Department of Justice.

1 (h) "DOT" means the United States Department of
2 Transportation.

3 (i) "FTE" means full-time equated position in the classified
4 service of this state.

5 (j) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

6 (k) "LEIN" means the law enforcement information network.

7 (l) "MCOLES" means the Michigan commission on law enforcement
8 standards created in section 3 of the Michigan commission on law
9 enforcement standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.603.

10 (m) "SIGMA" means the statewide integrated governmental
11 management application.

12 (n) "SRMS" means the state records management system.

13 (o) "Standard report recipients" means the senate and house
14 appropriations subcommittees on state police, the senate and house
15 fiscal agencies, the senate and house policy offices, and the state
16 budget office.

17 Sec. 204. A department or agency shall use the internet to
18 fulfill the reporting requirements of this part and shall make each
19 report readily accessible to the public and conspicuously post each
20 required report in a single archivable location on the department's
21 or agency's Michigan.gov website not later than the due date
22 required for each report. In addition to placing all reports
23 required in the current fiscal year on the department's or agency's
24 website, the department or agency shall maintain on its website all
25 reports placed on the website from previous fiscal years, posted by
26 fiscal year, in the same single archivable location. The department
27 or agency shall also transmit all required reports for the current
28 fiscal year to the standard report recipients and any other
29 required recipients by email.

1 Sec. 205. To the extent permissible under section 261 of the
2 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1261, all of the
3 following apply to the expenditure of funds appropriated in part 1:

4 (a) The funds must not be used for the purchase of foreign
5 goods or services, or both, if competitively priced and of
6 comparable quality American goods or services, or both, are
7 available.

8 (b) Preference must be given to goods or services, or both,
9 manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses, if they are
10 competitively priced and of comparable quality.

11 (c) Preference must be given to goods or services, or both,
12 that are manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses owned and
13 operated by veterans, if they are competitively priced and of
14 comparable quality.

15 Sec. 206. The department shall not take disciplinary action
16 against an employee of the department for communicating with a
17 member of the legislature or legislative staff, unless the
18 communication is prohibited by law and the department is exercising
19 its authority as provided by law.

20 Sec. 207. Consistent with section 217 of the management and
21 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1217, each department and agency
22 receiving appropriations in part 1 shall prepare a report on out-
23 of-state travel expenses not later than January 1 of each year. The
24 report must list all travel by classified and unclassified
25 employees outside this state in the previous fiscal year that was
26 funded in whole or in part with funds appropriated in the
27 department's or agency's budget. The department or agency shall
28 submit the report to the standard report recipients and to the
29 senate and house appropriations committees. The report must include

1 all of the following information:

2 (a) The dates of each travel occurrence.

3 (b) The total transportation and related costs of each travel
4 occurrence and the proportion funded with state general
5 fund/general purpose revenues, state restricted revenues, federal
6 revenues, local revenues, and private revenues, including specific
7 sources of state restricted, federal, and other revenues.

8 Sec. 208. If the state administrative board, acting under
9 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount
10 appropriated under part 1, the legislature may, by a concurrent
11 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and
12 serving in each house, intertransfer funds within part 1 for the
13 particular department, board, commission, officer, or institution.

14 Sec. 209. Not later than December 15, the state budget office
15 shall prepare and submit a report that provides estimates of the
16 total general fund/general purpose appropriation lapses at the
17 close of the previous fiscal year. The report must summarize the
18 projected year-end general fund/general purpose appropriation
19 lapses by major departmental program or program area. The state
20 budget office shall submit the report to the standard report
21 recipients and to the chairpersons of the senate and house
22 appropriations committees.

23 Sec. 210. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
24 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000.00 for
25 federal contingency authorization. Amounts appropriated are not
26 available for expenditure until they have been transferred to
27 another line item in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management
28 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

29 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is

1 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000.00 for state
2 restricted contingency authorization. Amounts appropriated are not
3 available for expenditure until they have been transferred to
4 another line item in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management
5 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

6 Sec. 211. The department shall cooperate with the department
7 of technology, management, and budget to maintain a searchable
8 website accessible by the public at no cost that includes, but is
9 not limited to, all of the following for the department:

10 (a) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by category.

11 (b) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by appropriation unit.

12 (c) Fiscal year-to-date payments to a selected vendor,
13 including the vendor name, payment date, payment amount, and
14 payment description.

15 Sec. 212. Not later than 14 days after the release of the
16 executive budget recommendation, the department shall cooperate
17 with the state budget office to provide an annual report on
18 estimated state restricted fund balances, state restricted fund
19 projected revenues, and state restricted fund expenditures for the
20 previous 2 fiscal years. The report must be submitted to the
21 standard report recipients and to the chairpersons of the senate
22 and house appropriations committees.

23 Sec. 213. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 must not be used to
24 restrict or impede a marginalized community's access to government
25 resources, programs, or facilities.

26 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1, local governments
27 shall report any action or policy that attempts to restrict or
28 interfere with the duties of a local health officer.

29 Sec. 214. To the extent permissible under the management and

1 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594, the director of
2 each department or agency receiving appropriations in part 1 shall
3 take all reasonable steps to ensure that geographically
4 disadvantaged business enterprises compete for and perform
5 contracts to provide services or supplies, or both. The director
6 shall strongly encourage firms with which the department contracts
7 to subcontract with geographically disadvantaged business
8 enterprises for services or supplies, or both. As used in this
9 section, "geographically disadvantaged business enterprises" means
10 that term as defined in Executive Directive No. 2023-01.

11 Sec. 215. (1) The department shall maximize utilization of its
12 in-person state workforce. The department shall prioritize
13 occupancy utilization of office space for each division within the
14 department. Employees with job responsibilities that require the
15 employees to serve in their capacities outside of an office shall
16 be monitored each pay period to ensure all work hours reported on
17 the timesheet were actually worked.

18 (2) The department shall comply with requirements set forth by
19 the office of the state employer on in-person work and utilization
20 and occupancy rates of state buildings to ensure in-person work is
21 optimized and occupancy rates are 80% or higher, subject to market
22 conditions.

23 (3) The department shall adhere to civil service rules and
24 regulations that state the standard biweekly work period for a
25 full-time employee in the classified service of this state is the
26 equivalent of 80.0 hours of work. The department shall establish
27 policies and processes to ensure all employees are working their
28 jobs during agreed-upon business hours.

29 Sec. 216. On a quarterly basis, the department or agency

1 receiving appropriations in part 1 shall report on the number of
2 full-time equated positions in pay status by civil service
3 classification, including a comparison by line item of the number
4 of full-time equated positions authorized from funds appropriated
5 in part 1 to the actual number of full-time equated positions
6 employed by the department at the end of the reporting period. The
7 report must be submitted to the standard report recipients and to
8 the senate and house appropriations committees.

9 Sec. 218. A department or agency that receives an
10 appropriation under this part or part 1 must provide an annual
11 report to the standard report recipients detailing federal policy
12 changes that do, or are expected to do, any of the following:

13 (a) Affect the operations of the department, including
14 reductions in federal revenue. For federal revenue reductions, the
15 annual report must detail the impact on the department or agency
16 and residents of this state, including, but not limited to, all of
17 the following information:

18 (i) The amount of additional state revenue required to replace
19 the lost federal revenue.

20 (ii) The services the department or agency will have to reduce
21 or eliminate due to the lost revenue.

22 (iii) The anticipated fiscal impact on residents of this state.

23 (b) Affect an industry, community, population, or other group
24 regulated or served by, or that otherwise engages with, the
25 department or agency.

26 (c) Create a regulatory gap that could negatively impact the
27 public.

28 (d) Increase the department's or agency's costs.

29 (e) Reduce or eliminate a program that provides services to

1 residents of this state.

2 Sec. 219. The department shall receive and retain copies of
3 all reports funded from appropriations in part 1. The department
4 shall follow federal and state law and guidelines for short-term
5 and long-term retention of records. The department may
6 electronically retain copies of reports unless otherwise required
7 by federal and state guidelines.

8 Sec. 220. Not later than April 1, the department shall report
9 on each specific policy change made to implement a public act
10 affecting the department that took effect during the previous
11 calendar year. The report must include reference to the public act
12 that necessitates the policy change. The department shall submit
13 the report to the standard report recipients, the senate and house
14 appropriations committees, and the joint committee on
15 administrative rules.

16 Sec. 222. To the extent possible, the department shall not
17 expend appropriations under part 1 until all existing authorized
18 work project funds available for the same purposes are exhausted.

19 Sec. 223. Not later than 6 months after the state budget
20 office issues work project letters, the department shall submit an
21 annual report that summarizes all work project accounts. The report
22 must include all of the following:

23 (a) A list of all work project accounts.

24 (b) The status of all work project accounts, including amounts
25 expended, amounts encumbered, and available balances for each
26 account.

27 (c) The amount of funds that lapsed from any previously
28 designated work project accounts, the name and description of the
29 work project account, and the funds that received the lapsed

1 amounts.

2 Sec. 224. Total authorized appropriations from all sources
3 under part 1 for legacy costs for the fiscal year ending September
4 30, 2027 are estimated at \$126,492,400.00. From this amount, total
5 appropriations for pension-related legacy costs for the department
6 are estimated at \$99,258,100.00. Total appropriations for retiree
7 health care legacy costs for the department are estimated at
8 \$27,234,300.00.

9 Sec. 225. Not later than April 1, the department shall provide
10 to the standard report recipients a copy of its annual strategic
11 plan prepared in compliance with section 363 of the management and
12 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1363. The plan must include the
13 mission, vision, goals, strategies, and performance measures of the
14 department.

15 Sec. 226. The department shall report on any court settlement
16 that may require further legislative review of state statutory
17 programs or regulations.

18 Sec. 227. Not later than November 15, the department shall
19 disclose on a publicly accessible website private and other third-
20 party funds received by the department in the previous fiscal year.
21 The report must include the amount of funding received, the
22 specific source of funding received, the purpose for which funding
23 was expended, and the amount of any remaining funds. The report
24 must be submitted to the standard report recipients and to the
25 chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations committees.

26 Sec. 228. The department shall submit a biannual report on the
27 performance metrics cited or information required to be reported in
28 this part, reasons for nonachievement of metric targets, and
29 proposed corrective actions.

1 Sec. 229. (1) It is the intent of the legislature that the
2 department shall take all steps necessary to protect the data and
3 privacy of citizens who are not the focus of a departmental
4 investigation and to protect personal information from unauthorized
5 access or misuse. The protection required under this subsection
6 includes, but is not limited to, all of the following:

7 (a) Requiring vendors or service providers to protect data
8 shared with them.

9 (b) Ensuring that when personal data is collected, but no
10 longer utilized by the department, that reasonable steps be taken
11 to securely destroy records containing personal information when it
12 is to be discarded so that the information is rendered
13 indecipherable and is not sold for marketing or other purposes.

14 (2) The department shall provide written notification to any
15 data subject whose sensitive personal information is accessed or
16 acquired by an unauthorized person.

17 Sec. 230. (1) Within 30 days of enactment of this act, the
18 house and senate shall provide to the state budget office a jointly
19 agreed-upon list of legislatively directed spending items funded in
20 part 1 as defined in section 364 of the management and budget act,
21 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1364. The list must include all information and
22 documents pertaining to the funded items as publicly disclosed in
23 accordance with sections 364 and 364a of the management and budget
24 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1364 and 18.1364a.

25 (2) In accordance with section 364(4) of the management and
26 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1364, the department or agency
27 administering the grant shall post a report in a publicly
28 accessible location on its website beginning March 15 of the
29 current fiscal year. The department or agency shall update the

1 report and shall post an updated report not later than June 15 of
2 the current fiscal year, and again not later than September 15 of
3 the current fiscal year. The department shall include in the report
4 the most comprehensive information the department has available at
5 the time of posting for grants awarded.

6 Sec. 231. (1) The department may accept monetary and
7 nonmonetary gifts, bequests, donations, contributions, or grants
8 from any private or public source to support, in whole or in part,
9 a departmental function or program. The department shall expend or
10 use the gifts, bequests, donations, contributions, or grants
11 accepted under this subsection for the purposes designated by the
12 private or public source, if the purpose is specified.

13 (2) Revenue collected by the department under this section
14 that is unexpended and unencumbered must not lapse to the general
15 fund but must be carried forward to the subsequent fiscal year.

16 (3) Private revenues received under this section that exceed
17 the appropriations in part 1 are appropriated and may be received
18 and expended by the department for the purposes for which the funds
19 are received.

20 (4) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the
21 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify
22 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on state police
23 and the senate and house fiscal agencies within 10 days after the
24 approval. The notification must include the amount and funding
25 source of the additional authorization, the date of the approval,
26 and the projected use of the funds to be expended.

27 Sec. 232. (1) Federal revenues authorized by and available
28 from the federal government in excess of the appropriations in part
29 1 are appropriated and may be received and expended by the

1 department for purposes authorized under state law and subject to
2 federal requirements. The total amount of federal revenues that may
3 be received and expended under this section and section 704(3) must
4 not exceed \$750,000,000.00.

5 (2) The department shall notify the standard report recipients
6 before expending federal revenues received and appropriated under
7 subsection (1).

8 (3) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the
9 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify
10 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on state police
11 and the senate and house fiscal agencies within 10 days after the
12 approval. The notification must include the amount and funding
13 source of the additional authorization, the date of its approval,
14 and the projected use of the funds to be expended.

15 Sec. 233. The state budget director shall take steps to ensure
16 that all state fiscal recovery funds allocated to this state under
17 the American rescue plan act of 2021, Public Law 117-2, are
18 expended by December 31, 2026, as required by law. Any state fiscal
19 recovery funds that would otherwise lapse after September 30, 2026,
20 are automatically reappropriated for the same purpose as originally
21 authorized and available for expenditure through December 31, 2026,
22 and any subsequent financial closeout period.

23 Sec. 234. (1) The state budget director shall take steps to
24 ensure that all state fiscal recovery funds allocated to this state
25 under the American rescue plan act of 2021, Public Law 117-2, are
26 expended by December 31, 2026, as required by law. The state budget
27 director may reallocate appropriated funds for the purpose of fully
28 utilizing state fiscal recovery funds that are in jeopardy of not
29 meeting the expenditure deadline for reasons that may include, but

1 are not limited to, completed projects coming in under budget or
2 funds unable to be fully used by subrecipients. The state budget
3 director shall reallocate any of the funds reallocated under this
4 subsection to the programs or purposes specified in this section.
5 Any funds reallocated are unappropriated and immediately
6 reappropriated for the following purposes:

7 (a) To reclassify general fund/general purpose appropriations
8 for payroll and covered benefits for eligible public health and
9 safety employees at the department of corrections.

10 (b) To reclassify general fund/general purpose appropriations
11 for payroll and covered benefits for eligible public health and
12 safety employees at the department of state police.

13 (2) All applicable guidance, implementation, and reporting
14 provisions of Public Law 117-2 must be followed for state fiscal
15 recovery funds reallocated and reappropriated under subsection (1).

16 (3) The state budget director shall notify the senate and
17 house appropriations committees not later than 1 business day after
18 making any reallocations under subsection (1). The notification
19 must include the authorized program under which funds were
20 originally appropriated, the amount of the reallocation, the
21 program, or programs, or purpose, and the department to which the
22 funds are being reallocated under subsection (1), and the amount
23 reallocated to each program or purpose.

24 Sec. 235. (1) In addition to any other requirements under this
25 part, if the department is authorized under this part to expend
26 funds in addition to those appropriated in part 1, the department
27 must do all of the following:

28 (a) Not later than November 1, provide a report to the
29 chairpersons of the house and senate appropriations committees, the

1 house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget office that
2 details all of the following:

3 (i) The type of funding received during the previous fiscal
4 year that was authorized in part 2 of the article that made
5 appropriations for the department in the previous fiscal year.

6 (ii) When the funding was received.

7 (iii) The amount of funding received.

8 (iv) How much of the funding was spent and for what purpose or
9 purposes.

10 (b) Not later than 60 days after receipt of funds authorized
11 under this part, provide a report to the chairpersons of the house
12 and senate appropriations committees, the house and senate fiscal
13 agencies, and the state budget office that details all of the
14 following:

15 (i) The type of funding received.

16 (ii) When the funding was received.

17 (iii) The amount of funding received.

18 (iv) The anticipated or actual amount to be spent and the
19 specified purpose or purposes.

20 (c) Not later than February 15, provide a report to the
21 chairpersons of the house and senate appropriations committees, the
22 house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget office with
23 an estimate of funding authorized by this part that the department
24 anticipates it will receive in the subsequent fiscal year,
25 identifying all of the following:

26 (i) The type or types of funding anticipated.

27 (ii) The amount or amounts of funding anticipated.

28 (iii) The purpose or purposes of the funding.

29 (2) If another reporting requirement under this part would

1 provide substantially similar information on a substantially
2 similar time frame as would be reported under subsection (1),
3 subsection (1) does not apply.
4

5 **DEPARTMENTAL ADMINISTRATION AND SUPPORT**

6 Sec. 301. The department shall notify the standard report
7 recipients when it recommends to close or consolidate any state
8 police post. The notification must include a local and state impact
9 study of the proposed post closure or consolidation.

10 Sec. 302. If the department presents a plan to the state
11 employer to privatize, the department shall submit a complete
12 project plan to the standard report recipients. The plan must
13 include the criteria under which the privatization initiative will
14 be evaluated. The evaluation must be completed and submitted to the
15 standard report recipients within 30 months.

16 Sec. 303. (1) When the department provides contractual
17 services to a local unit of government, the department shall be
18 reimbursed for all costs incurred in providing the services.

19 (2) The department shall define service cost models for those
20 services requiring reimbursement.

21 (3) Contractual services provided to an entity other than a
22 local unit of government may be provided by department personnel,
23 but only on an overtime basis outside the normal work schedule of
24 the personnel. All costs incurred in providing the services are
25 eligible for reimbursement.

26 (4) This section does not apply to services provided to state
27 agencies.

28 (5) Revenues received for contractual or reimbursed services
29 in excess of the appropriations in part 1 are appropriated and may

1 be received and expended by the department for the purposes for
2 which the funds are received.

3 (6) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the
4 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify
5 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on state police
6 and the senate and house fiscal agencies within 10 days after the
7 approval. The notification must include the amount and funding
8 source of the additional authorization, the date of its approval,
9 and the projected use of the funds to be expended.

10 Sec. 304. The department may establish and collect fees for
11 publications, videos, conferences, workshops, and related
12 materials. Fees collected under this section must be used to offset
13 expenditures for costs of the publications, videos, workshops,
14 conferences, and related materials. The department shall not
15 collect fees under this section that exceed the cost of the
16 expenditures.

17 Sec. 305. A law enforcement officer funded under part 1 shall
18 not be required to issue a predetermined or specified number of
19 citations for violations of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300,
20 MCL 257.1 to 257.923, or of a local ordinance that substantially
21 corresponds to the provisions of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA
22 300, MCL 257.1 to 257.923, including parking or standing
23 violations. A law enforcement officer's performance evaluation
24 system must not require a predetermined or specified number of
25 citations to be issued.

26 Sec. 306. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
27 department may purchase real property and shall notify the standard
28 report recipients within 10 days of the purchase.

29

LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

1 Sec. 401. (1) The department shall develop and deliver
2 professional, innovative, and quality training that supports the
3 enforcement and public safety efforts of the criminal justice
4 community.
5

6 (2) The department shall provide performance data, as provided
7 under section 228, for days of training being conducted by the
8 academy.

9 (3) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for training
10 operations, the department may provide or obtain the following
11 training:

12 (a) Training that directly relates to the individual's job
13 description and role within the department.

14 (b) Professional development training.

15 (c) Training that provides the individual with the ability to
16 seek expanded opportunities within the department.

17 (d) Advanced education training.

18 (4) Not later than January 1, the department shall submit a
19 report to the standard report recipients and to the senate and
20 house appropriations committees that includes the following
21 information about the funds appropriated in part 1 for training
22 operations:

23 (a) The training courses that the department's employees
24 completed.

25 (b) If a training course is developed by the department, a
26 description of that course's curriculum and its purpose.

27 (c) The number of the department's employees who have received
28 and completed training pursuant to this section.

29 (5) The department shall distribute and review course

1 evaluations to ensure that quality training is provided.

2 Sec. 402. (1) In accordance with applicable state and federal
3 laws and regulations, the department shall maintain and ensure
4 compliance with CJIS databases and applications in the support of
5 public safety and law enforcement communities.

6 (2) The department shall improve the accuracy, timeliness, and
7 completeness of criminal history information by conducting a
8 minimum of 30 outreach activities targeted to criminal justice
9 agencies. The department shall report the number of these outreach
10 activities conducted, as provided under section 228.

11 (3) The department shall provide for the compilation of crime
12 statistics consistent with the uniform crime reporting (UCR)
13 program and the national incident-based report system (NIBRS).

14 (4) The department shall provide for the compilation and
15 evaluation of traffic crash reports and the maintenance of the
16 state accident data collection system.

17 (5) The department shall make individual traffic crash reports
18 available for a fee of \$15.00 per incident. The department may also
19 sell an extract of electronic traffic crash data for a fee of \$0.25
20 per incident, provided that the name, address, and any other
21 personal identifying information have been excluded.

22 (6) By March 1, the department shall submit a report to the
23 standard report recipients detailing the number of traffic crash
24 reports provided, the amount of revenue collected, and all
25 expenditures incurred for activities under subsection (5) in the
26 preceding fiscal year. The report must include an analysis of
27 whether revenue from department activities under subsection (5) is
28 sufficient to offset all costs incurred for those activities and
29 must provide information regarding any deficit or surplus of

1 revenue.

2 (7) In accordance with applicable state and federal laws and
3 regulations, the department shall provide for the maintenance and
4 dissemination of criminal history records and juvenile records,
5 including to the extent necessary to exchange criminal history
6 records information with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and
7 other states through the interstate identification index, the
8 National Crime Information Center, and other federal CJIS databases
9 and indices.

10 (8) The department shall, in accordance with applicable state
11 and federal laws, provide for the maintenance of records, including
12 criminal history records regarding firearms licensure, as provided
13 under 1927 PA 372, MCL 28.421 to 28.435.

14 (9) The department shall provide information on the number of
15 background checks processed through the internet criminal history
16 access tool (ICHAT), as provided in section 228.

17 (10) The following unexpended and unencumbered revenues
18 deposited into the criminal justice information center service fees
19 must not lapse to the general fund, but must be carried forward
20 into the subsequent fiscal year:

21 (a) Fees for fingerprinting and criminal record checks and
22 name-based criminal record checks under 1935 PA 120, MCL 28.271 to
23 28.274.

24 (b) Fees for application and licensing for initial and renewal
25 concealed pistol licenses under 1927 PA 372, MCL 28.421 to 28.435.

26 (c) Fees for searching, copying, and providing public records
27 under the freedom of information act, 1976 PA 442, MCL 15.231 to
28 15.246.

29 (d) Revenue from other sources, including, but not limited to,

1 investment and interest earnings.

2 (11) Unexpended and unencumbered revenue generated by state
3 records management system fees must not lapse to the general fund,
4 but must be carried forward into the subsequent fiscal year.

5 Sec. 403. (1) The department shall provide forensic testing
6 and analysis/profiling of DNA evidence to aid in law enforcement
7 investigations in this state.

8 (2) The department shall ensure its ability to maintain
9 accreditation by a federally designated accrediting agency, as
10 provided under 34 USC 12592.

11 (3) The department shall provide forensic science services
12 with an average turnaround time of 55 days, assuming an annual
13 caseload volume commensurate with the average annual caseload
14 received by the forensic science division during the preceding 5
15 fiscal years, and shall work to achieve a goal of a 30-day average
16 turnaround time across all forensic science disciplines.

17 (4) The department shall provide the following data as
18 provided in section 228:

19 (a) The average turnaround time for processing forensic
20 evidence across all disciplines.

21 (b) Forensic laboratory staffing levels, including scientists
22 in training, and vacancies.

23 (c) The number of backlogged cases in each discipline.

24 Sec. 404. (1) The biometrics and identification division shall
25 maintain and manage the automated biometric identification system,
26 statewide network of agency photographs, and combined offender DNA
27 index system biometric databases.

28 (2) The department shall provide data on the number of 10-
29 print and palm-print submissions to the database, as provided in

1 section 228.

2 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
3 necessary to have a 28-day average wait time for scheduling a
4 polygraph examination, assuming an annual caseload received
5 commensurate with the average annual caseload received during the
6 preceding 5 fiscal years, with a goal of achieving a 15-day average
7 wait time.

8 (4) If changes are made to the department's protocol for
9 retaining and purging DNA analysis samples and records, the
10 department shall post a copy of the protocol changes on the
11 department's website.

12 Sec. 405. Not later than December 1, the department shall
13 submit a report to the standard report recipients that includes,
14 but is not limited to, all of the following information:

15 (a) Sexual assault kit analysis backlog at the beginning of
16 the previous fiscal year.

17 (b) The number of sexual assault kits collected or submitted
18 for analysis during the previous fiscal year.

19 (c) The number of sexual assault kits analyzed and the number
20 of associated DNA profiles created and uploaded during the previous
21 fiscal year.

22 (d) Sexual assault kit analysis backlog at the end of the
23 previous fiscal year.

24 (e) The average turnaround time to analyze sexual assault kits
25 and to create and upload associated DNA profiles for the previous
26 fiscal year.

27 Sec. 406. The department shall provide administrative support
28 for the following grant and community service programs:

29 (a) The operations of the automobile theft prevention

1 authority.

2 (b) Administration of the Edward Byrne memorial justice
3 assistance program and other grant programs, including the
4 department's community policing efforts.

5 (c) Administration of the office of school safety.

6 (d) Administration and outreach of the OK2SAY program.

7 Sec. 407. Not later than March 30, the office of school safety
8 shall provide a school safety report to the legislature and the
9 senate and house fiscal agencies that must include reports of all
10 of the following:

11 (a) The incidents of school violence or threats reported to
12 the state police by local law enforcement or local school
13 districts, or received through the Michigan incident crime report
14 (MICR).

15 (b) OK2SAY-based incidences and activities.

16 (c) Based upon an evaluation of school safety incidents,
17 recommendations on best practices and other safety measures to
18 ensure school safety in this state.

19 Sec. 408. (1) The department shall make an organized,
20 strategic effort to recruit, onboard, train, and outfit trooper
21 school candidates and other new employees using the funds
22 appropriated in part 1.

23 (2) The department shall submit a report to the standard
24 report recipients within 60 days of the conclusion of any trooper,
25 motor carrier, or state properties security recruit school. The
26 report must include all of the following:

27 (a) The number of veterans and the number of MCOLES-certified
28 police officers who were admitted to and the number who graduated
29 from the recruit school.

1 (b) The total number of recruits who were admitted to the
2 recruit school, the number of recruits who graduated from the
3 recruit school, and the location at which each of these recruits is
4 assigned.

5 (3) The department may use the funds appropriated in part 1
6 that represent attrition savings to offset the cost of recruiting
7 efforts described under subsection (1).

8 (4) The unexpended and unencumbered general fund/general
9 purpose funds appropriated in part 1 for training operations must
10 not lapse to the general fund at the end of the fiscal year but
11 must be deposited into the trooper recruit school fund created
12 under section 819b of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL
13 257.819b.

14 Sec. 409. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
15 department shall, in collaboration with the department of civil
16 rights and MCOLES, provide the following training to local police
17 departments or officers free of charge:

18 (a) Diversity and cultural awareness and competency.

19 (b) Conflict management.

20 (c) Use of force on vulnerable individuals, including
21 children, individuals with disabilities, individuals with unmet
22 mental health needs, individuals under the influence of substances,
23 and pregnant individuals.

24 (d) Mental health and wellness for law enforcement officers.

25 (2) The training provided under subsection (1) may be offered
26 online in order to facilitate easy access and may be given by
27 department staff, contractors, or external vendors.

28 (3) On a quarterly basis, the department shall submit a report
29 to the standard report recipients on the number of officers, by

1 police department, that received training under this section.

2 Sec. 410. The department, in collaboration with the department
3 of health and human services and the department of education, shall
4 advise on initiatives in schools and other educational
5 organizations that include, but are not limited to, training for
6 educators, teachers, and other personnel in school settings for all
7 of the following:

8 (a) Utilization of trauma-informed practices.

9 (b) Age-appropriate education and information on human
10 trafficking.

11 (c) Age-appropriate education and information on sexual abuse
12 prevention.

13 Sec. 411. Based on the availability of federal funding and
14 demonstrated need, as indicated by applications submitted to the
15 state court administrative office, the department shall provide
16 \$1,500,000.00 in Byrne justice assistance grant program funding to
17 the judiciary by interdepartmental grant.

18

19 **MICHIGAN COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS**

20 Sec. 501. (1) MCOLES shall establish standards for the
21 selection, employment, training, education, licensing, and
22 licensure revocation of all law enforcement officers and provide
23 the basic law enforcement training curriculum for law enforcement
24 training academy programs statewide.

25 (2) MCOLES shall maintain staffing and resources necessary to
26 update law enforcement standards within 120 days of the enactment
27 date of any new public acts that affect MCOLES.

28 (3) From the funds appropriated in part 1, MCOLES, by March 1,
29 shall submit a report to the standard report recipients that

1 includes a summary of MCOLES activities during the prior calendar
2 year. The report required under this subsection must include, but
3 is not limited to, both of the following:

4 (a) An account of the distribution of training funds
5 administered by MCOLES.

6 (b) A list of recipients that received training funds under
7 subdivision (a) and the amount received by each recipient and for
8 what purpose it was used.

9 Sec. 502. The general fund/general purpose funds appropriated
10 in part 1 for public safety officers benefit fund must be deposited
11 into the public safety officers benefit fund created in section 3
12 of the public safety officers benefit act, 2004 PA 46, MCL 28.633.
13 All funds in the public safety officers benefit fund are
14 appropriated and available for expenditure in accordance with
15 section 3 of the public safety officers benefit act, 2004 PA 46,
16 MCL 28.633.

17 Sec. 503. Funds appropriated in part 1 for in-service training
18 must be deposited into the law enforcement officers training fund
19 created in section 11(7) of the Michigan commission on law
20 enforcement standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.611. All funds in
21 the law enforcement officers training fund are appropriated and
22 available for expenditure to support the implementation of required
23 annual in-service training standards for all licensed law
24 enforcement officers, in accordance with rules promulgated under
25 section 11(2) of the Michigan commission on law enforcement
26 standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.611.

27

28 **FIELD SERVICES**

29 Sec. 601. (1) Department enlisted personnel who are employed

1 to enforce traffic laws as provided in section 629e of the Michigan
2 vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.629e, are not prohibited from
3 responding to crimes in progress or other emergency situations and
4 are responsible for making every effort to protect all residents of
5 this state.

6 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
7 necessary to continually work to enhance traffic safety throughout
8 this state and shall dedicate a minimum of 455,200 hours to
9 statewide patrol. The department shall work to improve public
10 safety efforts within distressed cities by enhancing data analysis
11 capabilities and identifying crime trends and areas with high
12 occurrence of crime.

13 (3) The department shall report on the number of residence
14 checks of registered sex offenders conducted, as provided under
15 section 228.

16 Sec. 602. (1) The department shall identify and apprehend
17 criminals through criminal investigations in this state.

18 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
19 necessary to provide a comparable number of hours investigating
20 crimes as the average annual number provided during the preceding 5
21 fiscal years.

22 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
23 necessary to annually meet or exceed a case clearance rate of 62%.

24 (4) The department shall provide training opportunities to
25 local law enforcement partners with the goal of increasing their
26 knowledge of gambling laws, legal issues, opioid-related
27 investigations, and other emerging law enforcement issues.

28 (5) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
29 necessary to investigate the average annual number of opioid-

1 related investigations conducted by multijurisdictional task forces
2 and hometown security teams during the preceding 5 fiscal years.
3 The department shall work to enhance investigative and drug
4 interdiction efforts by enhancing data analysis capabilities and
5 linking investigations among multijurisdictional task forces and
6 hometown security teams.

7 Sec. 603. (1) The department shall provide protection to this
8 state, its economy, welfare, and vital state-sponsored programs
9 through the prevention and suppression of organized smuggling of
10 untaxed tobacco products in this state, through enforcement of the
11 tobacco products tax act, 1993 PA 327, MCL 205.421 to 205.436, and
12 other laws pertaining to combating criminal activity in this state,
13 and by maintaining a tobacco tax enforcement unit.

14 (2) The department shall submit an annual report on December 1
15 to the standard report recipients and to the senate and house
16 appropriations subcommittees on general government that details
17 expenditures and activities related to tobacco tax enforcement for
18 the previous fiscal year.

19 Sec. 604. The department shall provide fire investigation
20 training and investigative assistance to public safety agencies in
21 this state.

22 Sec. 605. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
23 department shall make an organized, strategic effort to recruit
24 trooper school candidates and other new employees that mirror the
25 diverse racial, religious, and cultural backgrounds that make up
26 the communities in this state.

27

28 **SPECIALIZED SERVICES**

29 Sec. 701. (1) The department shall operate the Michigan

1 intelligence operations center for homeland security as this
2 state's primary federally designated fusion center to receive,
3 analyze, gather, and disseminate threat-related information among
4 federal, state, local, tribal, and private sector partners.

5 (2) The department shall ensure public safety by providing
6 public and private sector partners with timely and accurate
7 information regarding critical information key resource threats, as
8 reported to or discovered by the Michigan intelligence operations
9 center for homeland security, and shall increase public awareness
10 on how to report suspicious activity through website or telephone
11 communications.

12 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
13 necessary to support the cyber section, including the Michigan
14 cyber command center, the computer crimes unit, and the internet
15 crimes against children task force. The department shall maintain
16 the staffing and resources necessary to complete the average annual
17 number of cases completed by the computer crimes unit during the
18 preceding 5 fiscal years. The computer crimes unit shall pursue
19 process improvement initiatives to effectively utilize staff
20 resources in providing investigatory assistance and evidentiary
21 analysis for law enforcement and criminal justice agencies
22 statewide. The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
23 necessary to complete the average annual casework that the Michigan
24 cyber command center completed during the preceding 5 fiscal years.

25 (4) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
26 necessary to provide digital forensic analysis services with a goal
27 of decreasing backlogs of digital forensic analysis cases annually
28 until the department maintains a 60-day turnaround time.

29 Sec. 702. (1) The department shall provide specialized

1 services in support of, and to enhance, local, state, and federal
2 law enforcement operations within this state, in accordance with
3 all applicable state and federal laws and regulations.

4 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
5 necessary to provide training to maintain readiness to respond
6 appropriately to at least the average annual number of requests for
7 specialty services which occurred during the preceding 5 fiscal
8 years.

9 (3) The canine unit shall be available for call out statewide
10 100% of the time.

11 (4) The bomb squad unit shall be available for call out
12 statewide 100% of the time.

13 (5) The emergency support teams shall be available for call
14 out statewide 100% of the time.

15 (6) The marine services team shall be available for call out
16 statewide 100% of the time.

17 (7) Aviation services shall be available for call out
18 statewide 100% of the time, unless prohibited by weather or
19 unexpected mechanical breakdowns.

20 (8) The department shall maintain the staff and resources
21 necessary to provide security services at the State Capitol Complex
22 facilities, the State Secondary Complex, and other state-owned or
23 leased properties, as provided under section 6c of 1935 PA 59, MCL
24 28.6c. The department shall also maintain the staff and resources
25 necessary to respond to emergencies at the State Capitol Complex,
26 State Secondary Complex, House Office Building, Binsfeld Office
27 Building, Townsend Parking Ramp, Roosevelt Parking Ramp, and other
28 areas as directed. The department shall maintain a goal of annually
29 conducting 35,000 property inspections of state owned and leased

1 facilities.

2 Sec. 703. (1) The department shall maintain commercial vehicle
3 regulation, school bus inspections, and enforcement activities,
4 including enforcement of requirements concerning size, weight, and
5 load restrictions; operating authority; registration; fuel taxes;
6 transportation of hazardous materials; new entrant operations;
7 commercial driver licenses; and inspections pursuant to the federal
8 motor carrier assistance program.

9 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
10 necessary to meet inspection goals consistent with the department's
11 federal motor carrier assistance program activities.

12 (3) Revenue collected under the motor carrier act, 1933 PA
13 254, MCL 475.1 to 479.42, must be expended in accordance with that
14 act. Unexpended and unencumbered revenues must not lapse to the
15 general fund but must be carried forward into the subsequent fiscal
16 year.

17 Sec. 704. (1) The department shall coordinate the mitigation,
18 preparation, response, and recovery activities of municipal,
19 county, state, and federal governments, and other governmental
20 entities, for all hazards, disasters, and emergencies.

21 (2) The state director of emergency management may expend
22 money appropriated under part 1 to call on any agency or department
23 of this state or any resource of this state to protect life or
24 property or to provide for the health or safety of the population
25 in any area of this state in which the governor proclaims a state
26 of emergency or state of disaster under the emergency management
27 act, 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.401 to 30.421. The state director of
28 emergency management may expend the amounts the director considers
29 necessary to accomplish these purposes. The director shall submit

1 to the state budget director, as soon as possible, a complete
2 report of all actions taken under the authority of this section.
3 The report must contain, as a separate item, a statement of all
4 money expended that is not reimbursable from federal funding. The
5 state budget director shall review the expenditures and submit
6 recommendations to the legislature in regard to any possible need
7 for a supplemental appropriation.

8 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, the
9 department may receive and expend money from local, private,
10 federal, or state sources for the purpose of providing emergency
11 management training to local or private interests and for the
12 purpose of supporting emergency preparedness, response, recovery,
13 and mitigation activity. If additional expenditure authorization in
14 SIGMA is approved by the state budget office under this section,
15 the department and the state budget office shall notify the senate
16 and house appropriations subcommittees on state police and the
17 senate and house fiscal agencies within 10 days after the approval.
18 The notification must include the amount and source of the
19 additional authorization, the date of its approval, and the
20 projected use of the funds to be expended under the authorization.
21 The total amount of federal revenues that may be received and
22 expended under this section and section 232 must not exceed
23 \$750,000,000.00.

24 (4) The department shall foster, promote, and maintain
25 partnerships to protect this state and homeland from all hazards.

26 (5) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources
27 necessary to do all of the following:

28 (a) Serve approximately 105 local emergency management
29 preparedness programs and 88 local emergency planning committees in

1 this state.

2 (b) Operate and maintain the state's emergency operations
3 center and provide command and control in support of emergency
4 response services.

5 (c) Maintain readiness, including training and equipment to
6 respond to civil disorders and natural disasters commensurate with
7 the capabilities of fiscal year 2010-2011.

8 (d) Perform hazardous materials response training.

9 (6) The department shall conduct a minimum of 3 training
10 sessions to enhance safe response in the event of natural or
11 manmade incidents, emergencies, or disasters.

12 (7) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
13 appropriated from the disaster and emergency contingency fund an
14 amount necessary to cover costs related to any disaster or
15 emergency as defined in the emergency management act, 1976 PA 390,
16 MCL 30.401 to 30.421. Funds must be expended as provided under
17 sections 18 and 19 of the emergency management act, 1976 PA 390,
18 MCL 30.418 and 30.419, and R 30.51 to R 30.61 of the Michigan
19 Administrative Code.

20 (8) If, in a particular month, expenditures are made from the
21 disaster and emergency contingency fund, the department shall
22 submit a report for that month to the senate and house fiscal
23 agencies detailing the purpose of the expenditures. The monthly
24 report required under this subsection must be submitted within 30
25 days after the end of the month during which funds from the
26 disaster and emergency contingency fund were expended.

27 (9) The department shall track and report on a biannual basis,
28 as provided in section 228 of this part, the status of the
29 department's assessment of critical infrastructure vulnerabilities,

1 including the protection status of critical infrastructure items
2 identified by the assessment. The department is not required to
3 report any information that could compromise the security of any
4 critical infrastructure.

5 (10) Revenue collected by the department under this section
6 for the emergency management and homeland security training center
7 that is unexpended and unencumbered at the end of the fiscal year
8 must not lapse to the general fund, but must be carried forward
9 into the subsequent fiscal year.

10 Sec. 705. The department shall provide for the planning,
11 administration, and implementation of highway traffic safety
12 programs to save lives and reduce injuries on roads in this state,
13 in partnership with other public and private organizations.

14 Sec. 706. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for the secondary
15 road patrol program must be used to provide grants to sheriffs
16 under the secondary road patrol program described under section 76
17 of 1846 RS 14, MCL 51.76.

18 (2) The sheriffs' duties under the secondary road patrol
19 program, as outlined in section 76(2) of 1846 RS 14, MCL 51.76, are
20 to do all of the following:

21 (a) Patrol and monitor traffic violations.

22 (b) Enforce the criminal laws of this state, violations of
23 which are observed by or brought to the attention of the sheriff's
24 department while patrolling and monitoring secondary roads.

25 (c) Investigate accidents involving motor vehicles.

26 (d) Provide emergency assistance to persons on or near a
27 highway or road the sheriff is patrolling and monitoring.

28 Sec. 707. The department shall serve as an active liaison
29 between the department of technology, management, and budget and

1 state, local, regional, and federal public safety agencies on
2 matters pertaining to the Michigan public safety communications
3 system and shall report user issues to the department of
4 technology, management, and budget.

6 **ONE-TIME APPROPRIATIONS**

7 Sec. 801. (1) The general fund/general purpose funds
8 appropriated in part 1 for the disaster and emergency contingency
9 fund must be deposited into the disaster and emergency contingency
10 fund created in section 18 of the emergency management act, 1976 PA
11 390, MCL 30.418.

12 (2) Due to a significant increase in climate-related
13 emergencies and disaster events, the existing \$10,000,000.00
14 statutory cap and distribution guidelines in section 18 of the
15 emergency management act, 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.418, are not
16 sufficient. It is the intent of the legislature to complete passage
17 of Senate Bill No. 109 of 2025 and increase funding to meet the
18 needs of residents and communities impacted by emergencies or
19 disaster events.
